Message from Miss Marston Headteacher

Dear Parents/Carers

What a great start to the new term. Firstly, we are very proud of the success of our Leavers 2019. Yet again, another great set of examination results with the school's provisional progress score being well above national average. This means that pupils made fantastic progress from their starting points in Year 7, with many exceeding their target grades. Thankyou to everybody who helped to ensure that our leavers gained great results and were able to access their planned post-16 courses.

We had two training days at the start of term. Staff learnt about the new emphasis from Ofsted on personal development and the knowledge curriculum. As a catholic school we have always placed great importance on both personal and academic development of our pupils. Our Jesuit values and catholic ethos are embedded throughout the school, and integral to school life and the curriculum. This year's catholic ethos theme is 'Walking in the Kingdom of God'. We are encouraging all our pupils to think about their life journey, where they want to go, how they want to get there & who they want to be in the future. There will be many opportunities for reflection throughout the year. It is important that as a community, we do all we can to support our pupils through their life journey. We specifically want to encourage them to promote our Jesuit & Kingdom Values in order to be the person God is calling them to be.

With personal development in mind, we have launched a new subject into the Year 7 and 8 timetable, called Lifestyle lessons. During lifestyle lessons pupils are taught about life skills, healthy body and healthy mind. Pupils are given the opportunity to try out many different activities such as yoga, cross-stitch, gardening, topical debate and pet care. We hope that they will discover hobbies and activities that they enjoy and build them into their lifestyles for healthier bodies and minds. Why not visit . . .

There are many places in the local area which are linked to our curriculum, some of which are free to visit. Take a look at the ideas below:

- Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery is free to visit. It has a stained glass collection, religious paintings and artefacts from the Holy Land.
- 2. Lapworth Museum of Geology is free to visit. It is located on the University of Birmingham's campus in Edgbaston. A visit here will support pupils with an understanding of rocks and soils, a topic covered in year 8 Geography.
- 3. The Back to Back Houses are in the centre of Birmingham. A visit here will support pupils in developing an understanding of what life was like for ordinary working people in the 19th century. This links well to the current topic year 8's are studying in History- The Industrial Revolution.
- The Thinktank (Birmingham Science Museum) is £3 per person after 3pm during term time. Friday 25 October is a teacher training day at our school, so this may be a good day to visit.

Social Media

Social Media is a constant cause of concern for the Heads of Year at school - they are repeatedly dealing with unpleasant behaviour and online nastiness between pupils as a result of comments made on different sites. Can parents please remember that there are age restrictions in place for these sites and that outside of school hours it is a parent's responsibility to ensure that their child is using the internet appropriately. On Facebook the minimum age requirement is a hard and fast 13. It's the same age on Instagram, Pinterest, Tumblr, Reddit, Snapchat and Secret, too. The minimum age on LinkedIn is 14. On WhatsApp it's 16, and on Vine it's 17. Some platforms, such as YouTube, WeChat and Kik, have a minimum age required of 18, although children aged 13-17 can sign up with parent's permission.

This is a plea to pupils and parents alike - please can we ensure we all remember the message that all of us were taught right at the start of Primary School - how to cross the road in a safe and sensible manner.

Although we already have staff on duty at the end of the road, they should not have to remind pupils not to run out in front of cars! Please ensure you look both ways, and only when the road is clear, cross in a direct line from one side to the other, walking briskly. You should not be wearing headphones (which are banned from school anyway!) whilst crossing a road. Take care of yourselves.

Black Country Living Museum Trip By Miss Guest

On Tuesday 24 September, 27 Year 8 pupils went on a trip to the Black Country Living Museum with Mr Timmins and Miss Guest. The aim of the trip was for pupils to experience what life was like for people living in the Black Country during the Industrial Revolution (our current topic in History). 

Dear Parents/Carers and Students,

<u>'COUNTY LINES' EXPLOITATION</u>

It is likely you have heard the term 'County Lines' used in the news recently. This is a growing form of criminal activity that exists nationally, regionally across the West Midlands and here in Birmingham.

County Lines is a term used to describe how gangs and organised criminal networks export illegal drugs into other (mainly rural) areas by exploiting children and vulnerable adults, often without them realising it. Gang members may use coercion, intimidation, violence (including sexual violence) and weapons to do this. We are clear that this is child exploitation.

WARNING SIGNS

We want to support parents and carers to keep children safe; listed below are some warning signs of 'County Lines' exploitation for you to look out for. Often, these are behavioural changes such as:

- Returning home late, staying out all night or going missing
- Being found in areas away from home
- Increasing drug use, or being found to have large amounts of drugs on them
- Being secretive about who they are talking to and where they are going
- Unexplained absences from school, college, training or work
- Unexplained money, phone(s), clothes or jewellery
- Increasingly disruptive or aggressive behaviour
- Using sexual, drug-related or violent language you wouldn't expect them to know
- Coming home with injuries or looking particularly dishevelled
- Having hotel cards or keys to unknown places.

Birmingham schools are working together with West Midlands Police and partners, including The Children's Society, to prevent and spot signs of exploitation at the earliest opportunity. We're keen that parents are also aware of 'County Lines', know where to ask for more support if they are worried and know that you will be listened to and supported.

If you have any concerns about your child, speak to them calmly and explain the risks and consequences. You may wish to contact a member of the Pastoral Team at school if you feel you need support or believe your child is at risk. We can talk through your concerns and plan a way forward together.

If you or your child are aware that other young people in school or the community are at risk of 'County Lines' or any criminal exploitation, you should contact the police directly via 101. Alternatively you can contact Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111 or via <u>www.crimestoppers-uk.org</u>. If a crime is taking place or a life is in danger, call 999 immediately.
