

Message from Mr Jones Chair of Governors

Dear Parents/Carers

Guide me, o thou great Redeemer

As the Wales rugby team has shown the only place success comes before work is in a dictionary. It is also the case here at Saint John Wall School. The sustained improvement over the past few years in our GCSE results has been the consequence of the incredible amount of hard work of our staff and pupils alike.

At a recent governors' meeting Mr John informed us that our 2019 Progress 8 or P8 score is +0.82. As you will be aware a school's P8 is used by the government to measure the progress pupils have made since starting in Year 7. A P8 of 0.0 tells you pupils have achieved what is expected of them, no more no less. A P8 of +0.82 means that at Saint John Wall last year's Year 11 pupils performed almost a grade higher in every subject than pupils nationally. An astounding result I'm sure you'll agree. The government has recently published this year's official data for all schools so we can compare our performance with others https://www.compare-school-

performance.service.gov.uk/school/103534/st-john-wall-catholic-school/secondary

Congratulations to Miss Marston and her team of staff and of course to the pupils on this astonishing achievement - and many thanks to you as parents for all your support.

At a meeting two weeks ago governors heard from Ms Hanson and Miss Guest about what is already being done to ensure standards are maintained and so enable pupils, especially those in Year 11, to continue the success shown over the past three years. They both made clear that nothing will be left to chance to give the pupils here the very best chance of succeeding.

At the start of a new school year governors have the responsibility of reviewing and updating all our policies. Believe me there are dozens and dozens of them - I know because I had to sign them all! One of these, health and safety, and in particular safeguarding pupils tops the list of our priorities. Mrs Crooks recently provided training for governors on this topic. To make sure we understood it all she even gave us an assessment to complete. Parents can be certain that the safety of your children remains at the forefront of all the school's planning.

We were all appalled at the racist abuse the Villa defender Tyrone Mings and other England players were subjected to last week in Bulgaria. Without fail visitors to the school comment to Miss Marston on the harmony they witness between pupils as well as between staff and pupils at Saint John Wall. This doesn't just happen by chance. We heard from Mr Price at a recent governors' meeting on the developments in the Catholic Life of the school along with the plans for the coming year. This year's theme is: "Journey through the Kingdom of God"

Religious festivals will be a particular focus enabling pupils to explore other faiths. Special attention is currently being paid to the festival of Diwali which begins very soon. Mr Price was congratulated on his team's outstanding GCSE RE results. He was also thanked for ensuring the Gospel messages of love, compassion and understanding continue to spread throughout our school.

The school's Cultural Ambassadors have ensured that there have been several events celebrating Black History Month, and the diverse cultural heritage we can be so proud of at Saint John Wall. I'll end, therefore, with this prayer:

Almighty God, guide those who fan the fires of discrimination to open their eyes to the beauty of all your creation and to respect the human dignity of all your people. Amen.

Why not visit...

There are many places in the local area which are linked to our curriculum, some of which are free to visit. Take a look at the ideas below:

- Cycle or walk around Edgbaston Reservoir and look out for the church at one end and the golden roof of the Buddhist temple at the other.
- St Phillips Cathedral in the city centre and the surrounding graveyard (Pigeon Park). Look at the architecture, the decorations inside and the messages on the grave stones for ideas about the Trinity and life after death.
- 3. The Tolkien Trail including Moseley Bog and Sarehole Mill. This links to the year 9 Geography curriculum, pupils are learning about ecosystems and the living world.
- 4. Ladywood Leisure Centre is Birmingham's newest council leisure centre. It has swimming pools, a gym, a sauna, a steam room and a studio for fitness classes. The leisure centre is part of the "Be Active" scheme which means you can use the centre for free swimming, badminton, table tennis and more. To part of "Be Active" you need a leisure card all you need to do is fill in an application form at your local leisure centre. Take along two documents with your name and address.



By now you will be in the habit of using your examination homework guides and creating revision material. This week you created a revision timetable which you can use over half term. Your mock exams begin on Wednesday 6th November. Please use the week off to prepare for your examinations.

Please ensure that you remember the following expectations:

- You must have your own equipment (2 black pens, 2 pencils, 2 rulers, sharpener, and eraser, in a see-through bag or pencil case). Please make sure you know your room, seat number and the location in the gym.
- Mobile phones/Electronic devices/I Watches and Revision notes or other papers are not allowed to be kept in pockets in the gym and need to be stored in your coat/school bags or left in your locked classroom. Food and/or drinks are not allowed in the test room.
- The SILENCE rule starts as soon as you enter the gym until after you leave the examination room.
- Do not communicate with anyone else (this includes talking, looking around, making eye contact with another candidate, smiling, making signals etc.). Wear full School Uniform (blazers, shirts tucked in and ties, no jewellery, no trainers, etc.)

If there is any legitimate excuse, you need to speak to me and then your revision class teacher after, if approved. This area is stocked with resources for all subjects. Anyone disrupting study will be prohibited from using the facility. It is a learning space and must be treated as such.

Black History Month

This term students celebrated inspirational historical and modern day black figures who displayed creativity, integrity, leadership and innovation in the fields of Science, Politics and the Arts through their Daily Reflections in form time. Some examples of the figures pupils reflected on are: Dr.Shirley Jackson, Toussaint L'Ouverture and Handsworth's own Benjamin Zephaniah. Through these reflections, students paused to ask themselves which vocation they felt called to. Students also considered the meaning of integrity and reflected on inspirational quotes from these, alongside other notable figures.

In addition, pupils led a Collective Worship celebrating the history of black music - from rock and roll, blues and reggae to the origins of modern rap and hip-hop. Year 8 pupils - Crystabel Owusu, Simran Tiwana, Natalia Moszczynska, Nadwa Hassan and Leona Kollarova did a fantastic job of delivering this assembly to their peers, older and younger pupils.

In lessons, staff in all curriculum areas and subject groups incorporated links to Cultural Heritage and Black History into their lessons. Pupils were inspired by black inventors in Engineering, explored the role of the media in both propagating and challenging racist stereotypes during Creative iMedia and cooked Caribbean and African food in Food Technology amongst other things.

Alongside all of this, Advocates for Action members Ashrea Sehjail and Ruth Mumba had planned a surprise - a Heritage fair where staff and pupils could share stories of their heritage and enjoy food, music and pupils' performances. Ruth and Ashrea alongside Saagar Hans, Ritish Thakur, Sherea Black, Navhea Blake, Naomi Osayamwen, Amy Cutler, Joyce Jahle, Joyce Nkiambe, Jeitha Tabi and Ali Raza banded together under the title of Cultural Ambassadors. They planned and created a video with Mr Mull which allowed staff and pupils to share their opinions on the importance of culture and heritage. Throughout October we have been investigating Black History Month.

In the Health and Well-Being Family we have paid homage by integrating Black History Month in to our lessons.

Health and Social Care

We covered being predisposed to genetic medical conditions such as Sickle Cell Anaemia. The pupils learned that Sickle Cell disease is the name given to a group of lifelong (chronic) inherited conditions that affect haemoglobin. Most people affected are of African or African-Caribbean origin, although the sickle gene is found in all ethnic groups.

Hospitality and Catering

we visited the local Caribbean takeaway, where we purchased some products including patties, mutton soup and dumplings. The pupils were able to identify the cooking skills, ingredients and culinary terms associated with the products we had purchased.

'A Jamaican patty is a pastry that contains various fillings and spices baked inside a flaky shell, often tinted golden yellow with an egg yolk mixture or turmeric. It is made like a turnover, but is more savoury and filled with meat. As its name suggests, it is commonly found in Jamaica, and is also eaten in other areas of the Caribbean, such as the Caribbean coast of Nicaragua and Costa Rica. It is traditionally filled with seasoned ground beef, but fillings can include chicken, pork, lamb, vegetables, shrimp, lobster, fish, soy, ackee, mixed vegetables or cheese. In Jamaica, the patty is often eaten as a full meal, especially when paired with coco bread. It can also be made as bite-sized portions called cocktail patties. Among the Jamaican diaspora in the UK, the pastry is more like that of a suet crust, and often made with margarine or butter, which provides the flaky pastry, and curry powder containing turmeric, which provides the yellow colour'.

Child Development

The 'History of Black Midwives' will be dovetailed into the scheme of learning (antenatal care and birth) as we did not cover it this month due to revision and assessments. However, it is important for the pupils to understand and recognise the role of black midwives.

' When Europeans brought African slaves to the United States in the early 1600s, along with them came African women who were trained and practised as midwives, and who continued to do so and train others to do so during their lives as slaves. During this time in the colonies, midwives were still the primary source of care in birth for all families. As slavery grew, African midwives served both other African women as well as white women in birth. In the mid to late 1700s, obstetrics was introduced into America and by the early 1800s, the male physician had largely replaced the role of the midwife, particularly among upper and middleclass white Americans. However, in rural America and particularly in Black communities, midwives continued to serve in birth'.

HAPPY, SAFE HALLOWEEN/BONFIRE NIGHT - REMINDER FROM WEST MIDLANDS POLICE

With the darker nights fast approaching, it is important that students are reminded what we, as a school community, expect of them in terms of behaviour. Whilst we hope they will enjoy socialising with friends and family during the half-term break and the upcoming Halloween/Bonfire Night activities, we also want to ensure they feel confident to keep themselves safe and away from danger, crime and anti-social behaviour.

Parents/carers and students should already be aware that as part of our safeguarding arrangements, the school has a two-way information sharing agreement in place with West Midlands Police, and we are active members of the local Police & Schools Panel. This joint-approach helps us to intervene early to prevent and reduce crime and anti-social behaviour involving our students, and provide support and up-to-date safety messages.

In partnership with the police, we would like to remind our students about the following: -

• Anti-social behaviour: Halloween can be a scary time for people who don't like surprises or callers at their door. Think about how your actions and behaviour affect others; elderly and vulnerable people may be frightened by 'trick or treat' so look out for signs in windows that people do not want callers at their door.

Personal Safety:

- Be aware of your surroundings, take care of friends and family members and keep valuables such as phones out of public view whenever possible.
- Onn't drink alcohol, take illegal drugs or unknown substances; they can have a big impact on your health and safety, behaviour and your ability to do well at school and enjoy other interests and activities. They can also be addictive and have unpredictable side effects, including sudden death!
- West Midlands Fire Service recommends that you go to an organised display; it's the smart way to stay safe. You'll see a lot more fireworks and it's a lot cheaper. Information about firework safety is available at www.saferfireworks.com
- Weapons in public places: carrying a knife will get you a criminal record which can have life-long effects on travel and job prospects. Those who carry knives are also much more likely to be injured by them.
- **Off-road bikes:** These can only be ridden on private land with the landowner's permission. Don't risk your life and future prospects by illegally riding these on the road.
- Remember the company you keep: if your friend breaks the law, you may also be held responsible for that crime even if you weren't the one directly responsible.
