Headteacher's Message

We are a Catholic School For All, and we are proud to be a diverse, multi-cultural and multi-faith community all sharing common values and discovering our gifts and talents through the school's Catholic ethos. This month we are celebrating Black History Month and we have decided to have a number of different themes to engage everybody and bring our community even closer together.

This week we asked pupils to think about 'I have never seen a ..' This theme was reflecting on the fact that any career should be open to anybody whatever their background or culture. We want pupils of every background to aspire to the full range of careers. Next week we will have the theme 'We came here because...' This theme is encouraging all pupils in the community to explore migration and the variety of reasons why our school, and the city of Birmingham, are so multi-cultural. 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

Wellbeing: Top Tips

Healthy Breakfast

- Make breakfast a time to sit and eat with your kids. Being a good example is a powerful way to change their habits.
- If your child says he's not very hungry in the morning, try making a healthy smoothie, with milk and/or yogurt and include cut-up fresh or frozen fruit such as a banana, strawberries or blueberries.
- Another option is for your child to eat a small meal at home, such as a small bowl of oatmeal or a piece of wholegrain toast with nut butter. You can then give your child a healthy snack to eat before school starts – for example, a sandwich or some natural yoghurt with fruit.
- If a hectic morning schedule gets in the way of breakfast, try setting your child's alarm 10 minutes earlier, or packing your child's bag and laying out her clothes the night before. You could even get the next day's breakfast ready the night before

 mix pancake batter and have it ready for the morning or make egg and veggie frittatas in a muffin pan to warm them in the microwave.
- Sometimes kids can be picky eaters and respond better at mealtimes if the food is familiar. Offer your child healthy breakfast foods you know they like.
- Older children and teenagers might refuse to eat breakfast as a way of showing their independence. Try not to make a big deal about this. You could suggest your child try any of the above tips and take favourite foods that are portable to have on the trip to school instead. Your child might also like to choose his own healthy breakfast options when out shopping.





Please take a moment to go and have a look at the new display in the school's reception, dedicated to Katherine Johnson.


