Year 11 Parents' Evening



Amie and Borbor left no stone unturned to find help, but to no avail. Amie saw a group of new mothers coming along the road, their babies all healthy, and asked where they had come from. They told her about the Sisters. Amie went straight there. Even though they feared there was no hope for little Lombeh, they gave her benny mix – a local weaning food. Lombeh immediately began to improve. Now, aged five, Lombeh is a lively and energetic little girl, who can't believe the stories her mother tells her about when she was a baby.

As a school we have now walked 69.5km! Well done to all who have taken part so far.

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Year 10 Maths

This week, Mr Simmons and his Year 10 class spent a cold, Wednesday morning on the playground, exploring the topic of Loci. Loci is when a set of points all meet at a designated location. This can sound a little confusing, so the pupils acted out some mathematical scenarios to help them to understand the concept. Pupils had to stand a certain distance from various points and shapes, as well as standing equidistant between two points. They started to see the patterns on the playground, and then we all discussed how that could be transferred onto paper in the classroom. After returning to the classroom, pupils then tried a variety of GCSE questions, which showcased the skills and knowledge they had learnt that day.

Online Safety Alert – YUBO

The app YUBO which is a social/ chat room/ live stream type app.

There are concerns raised of the potential of adult abusers using this site to exploit children and young people.

Poor Age Restrictions/Privacy Settings: Although the terms and conditions state that Yubo is strictly for users above 13, there is no credible age-gate that can prevent a young child from joining the platform. Young people have been observed to connect with adults or mature teens on the app to chat with or even ask to be 'rated'. There is a growing concern that the app could be used for grooming. Adult predators have been known to create fake profiles displaying a teenager's persona to lure unsuspecting kids into conversations. It is almost impossible to verify the true identity of a Yubo user.

Livestream: The livestream feature is the most worrying. Children can initiate live video streams of their day, in their bedrooms or any other location. Any number of strangers can view the stream and can send questions or interact via live text chat. These are not restricted to friends alone and are often open to strangers; users are then encouraged to add unknown attendees/viewers as friends during the stream. In addition, questions from strangers on livestream may result in teenagers giving away personal information and the most disturbing part of this feature is that anyone can record a livestream.

Mobile Restaurant Experience

On Friday 11 March Key Stage 4 French pupils were all invited to an Immersive Restaurant Experience offered by JLH Languages. The gym was especially decorated for the occasion so that the immersion was total. The aim was for pupils to experience a typical French breakfast in a mobile restaurant setting introduced by two French waiters.

Firstly, pupils reviewed different table items (i.e. knife, fork, spoon, plate...) and were encouraged to take their chance in trying to recite as many items as they could remember. Mohit Badhan was the winner and was rewarded with a French medal!

Then pupils had to choose their drink and food from a menu and order in French to our two waiters. They had the choice between *croissant, pain au chocolat* and *tartines* with a variety of spreads (butter, nutella, honey, jam, etc). Pupils were given some puzzles to solve when waiting for their food so that no time was wasted and so that pupils kept on practising their French.

This experience has been extremely beneficial as pupils had the opportunity to interact with the waiters on many occasions such as; communicating with the waiters about their food, asking for some refills/food and asking about French culture.

Once everybody had finished with their food, all pupils and the waiters sang together in French to conclude this event and to say goodbye. Pupils all left with a big smile on their face and were very positive about their experience.

This was an amazing opportunity for pupils to boost their self-confidence in French as well as to learn more aspects of the French culture. I have been amazed by everyone who took part in this activity regarding their enthusiasm, politeness towards visitors and engagement.




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
