Consultation regarding changes to the school day

The government recently released an education White Paper titled Opportunity for all. This sets out their long-term vision for education. You can read the full report using the following link.

Part of this White Paper states that the government expect schools to operate a 32.5 hour week from September 2023. In order to fulfil this requirement, we need to extend the school day for our pupils at Saint John Wall. We plan to extend the school day by 10 minutes from September 2022. This means that school will finish at 3.10pm instead of 3.00pm. Before the covid pandemic the school used to finish at 3.10pm, so in effect we will be returning to pre-pandemic timings.

So, from September 2022 the school day for pupils will be 8.50am to 3.10pm. The school gates will continue to open from 8.20am for pupils if they wish to arrive early and use the breakfast club.

If parents and carers have any comments or feedback regarding this later finish time, please let me know by either telephoning the school, or putting your comments in writing by email or a letter.

Please provide me with your comments before Monday 18 July.








Leavers' 2022 Survey Results





Year 6 Transition Day



Tune Up Project

Over the past week, Year 10 have been busy with Tune Up to create a short piece of theatre for this year 'Culture in Common' project as part of the Birmingham 2022 Festival during the Commonwealth Games.

Saint John Wall were asked to be a partner school in this project to allow pupils to create their own work based around the theme of culture in and around Birmingham. The Year 10s have taken part in mini workshops to explore what it means by culture in their lives and in society.

Duke of Edinburgh Award

On the Friday 1 July, myself and Miss Lally accompanied 5 Year 9 and 10 pupils: Tanvir, Logan, Anay, Tobi and Jaydon to rural Worcestershire as they set off on the expedition element of their bronze Duke of Edinburgh award. In the weeks previous, pupils had completed various elements of preparation for this expedition, including: valuable first aid skills; cooking skills; map reading and how to set up camp. We were joined on the expedition by staff and pupils from Holy Trinity Catholic School.

On arrival to the Clent Hills, we were met with drizzling rain and grey skies. Not letting this deter them, the boys set off on their first ascent, leaving myself and Miss Lally behind. Despite a few challenges including a wrong turning and a hill or two, the boys completed their first day's walking in record pace, finishing the day's walk quicker than any of Holy Trinity's groups.

After a short minibus trip to Blackwell Court, our campsite for the night, the boys quickly got stuck into setting up their tents, a feat arguably more taxing than the walk itself. Although the Year 9 boys managed to pitch their tent with no issues, the same can unfortunately not be said for the Year 10 boys who needed the support of their younger compatriots to set up their shelter for the night. The boys also had to cook their own dinner and tidy the campsite before a well-deserved rest.

After a good night's sleep for most of our expeditioners, day 2 began. Although the route was less challenging than the previous day's, the boys still had to use problem solving to get themselves to their final destination, for example, asking members of the public for help when they wandered off course.

We were very proud of our pupils who worked together, showing resilience and upholding the Catholic values which have been instilled in them during their time at Saint John Wall.

RAF Museum Cosford

On Thursday 30 June, Miss Lastun and myself accompanied 18 Year 10 Historians to the Royal Air Force Museum Cosford. The trip was an opportunity for pupils to deepen their knowledge of the Cold War which pupils had been learning about in class. RAF Cosford opened in 1938 as a training site for RAF technicians but today houses the National Cold War Exhibition along with many different types of aircraft that have been used in some of Britain's greatest battles. Pupils explored the tense relationship between the Western Allies and the Soviet Bloc through interactive workshops and immersive museum exhibits. Through these learning experiences pupils were able to understand more about the very real threat of a nuclear war and the effects that this might have had on Britain. The most enjoyable part of the day for pupils was handling some very important Cold War artefacts. You can see how our Year 10 Historians got on in the images below!



















Dear Parents/Carers and Students,

HAPPY, SAFE SUMMER - REMINDER FROM WEST MIDLANDS POLICE

The summer holiday is fast approaching, it is important our students are reminded what we, as a school community, expect of them in terms of behaviour while they are enjoying socialising with friends and family during the break. We also want to ensure they feel confident to keep themselves safe and away from crime and anti-social behaviour.

Parents/carers and students should already be aware that as part of our safeguarding arrangements, the school has a two-way information sharing agreement in place with West Midlands Police, and we are active members of the local Police & Schools Panel. This joint approach helps us to intervene early to prevent and reduce crime and anti-social behaviour involving our students and provide support and up-to-date safety messages.

In partnership with the police, we would like to provide some reminders about the following:

• Personal Safety:

- Be aware of your surroundings, take care of friends and family members and keep valuables such as phones out of public view whenever possible.
- Don't drink alcohol, take illegal drugs or unknown substances; they can have a big impact on your health and safety, behaviour and your ability to do well at school and enjoy other interests and activities. They can also be addictive and have unpredictable side effects, including sudden death! Information is available at www.talktofrank.com
- Swimming in rivers/reservoirs: Reservoirs may look inviting, especially on a hot day, but they are extremely dangerous places to swim. If you jump in, you may not be able to get out as the sides are very steep; the water never gets above 11 degrees, and this will affect your ability to breathe and to move. Rivers and reservoirs may contain broken glass and may be deeper than you think.
- Social Media: Don't allow your use of social media to put you at risk of grooming, exploitation or regret in future. Use social media positively and avoid being negative about anyone online as comments/actions may be traced back to you and you will be held accountable.
- Weapons in public places: Carrying a knife or other weapon will get you a criminal record which can have lifelong effects on travel and job prospects. Those who carry knives are also much more likely to be injured by them.
- Anti-social behaviour: Think about your actions towards others; a little thought & respect goes a long way.
- Off-road bikes: These can only be ridden on private land with the landowner's permission. Don't risk your life and future prospects by illegally riding these on the road.
- Remember the company you keep: If your friend breaks the law, you may also be held responsible for that crime even if you weren't the one directly responsible.


