This week in Weekly Worship... Pupils were introduced to Saint John Wall's Lenten Challenge. The Weekly Worship was led by our Year 7 Chaplaincy Team and reflected on the Gospel of Saint Matthew and how Jesus came to fulfil the work of the Prophets. Message from Chair of Governors

"Shine in our hearts, shine through the darkness"

Last weekend I had the privilege of witnessing one of my grandchildren receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. The chorus of the opening hymn, *Christ Be Our Light'*, contains the words shown above. For Christians, Jesus Christ is the Light of the World. As the amount of daylight slowly increases we appreciate the important role light actually plays in our lives. It brings the first signs of Spring accompanied with a renewed sense hope, something we're all badly in need of considering the despondency caused by the horrifying Turkey-Syria Earthquake, the on-going war in Ukraine and, nearer to home, the problems presented by the cost of living crisis.

Some good news that gave us optimism for the future was Mr Luke Payton joining our governing body. Mr Payton has much experience of Catholic education and will enhance even further our strong team of governors. At his first meeting Mr Payton heard Mr Lloyd-Price provide governors with a very detailed account of Catholic Life at Saint John Wall and how we are responding to the new Framework introduced by the Catholic School Inspectorate. An area focused on was Collective Worship and in particular the prayer said right across the school marking the end of each day. Several times I've been meeting with Miss Marston when it has come around and on each occasion I have found it truly moving. Many other examples of the rich array of experiences our chaplaincy team offer pupils may be seen on our excellent website (www.sjw.bham.sch.uk).

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The news at the moment seems to be filled with protests against the government's continued reduction in funding public services. You will be aware of the cuts to budgets that schools have faced over the past ten years. Saint John Wall is no exception. Back at the start of term governors met to plan for the new financial year which begins in April. We literally went through the school budget line by line trying to find savings without diluting the quality of our pupils' education. The wise stewardship of our finances by Mr Holden and Miss Whitehouse is ensuring we receive the best value for the money we do spend. Incidentally Miss Marston mentioned how pleased she was with the co-operation and understanding shown by parents and pupils on the national strike day earlier this month.

At another recent governors' meeting Mr Holder explained how Year 11 pupils are being geared up for what lies ahead of them over the coming few months. When they return after the half-term break they'll be sitting their Mock Exams which as well as giving invaluable practice for the summer exams also provides each individual pupil with detailed information about whether or not they are meeting their targets and more importantly identifying areas they still need to improve upon. It was clear from Mr Holder that everything is being done to enable Year 11 pupils to repeat the outstanding success the school has achieved in recent years.

At the same meeting Ms Hanson showed how Year 8 pupils are not being neglected. She described the well thought-out programme of guidance and advice pupils will be offered as they choose from a broad selection of vocational and GCSE subjects to study through to Year 11. Living in Birmingham young people are spoilt for choice when it comes to the courses available from 16 years of age onwards. Ms Hanson stressed the trust parents have in what the school is doing enables each pupil to be matched to the appropriate menu of subjects he or she takes up.

Staff work extremely hard with parents to make sure pupils attend school. If absent they are challenged as to why their child isn't at school. Vindication of this strategy may be seen on our web-site which shows the school has received two prestigious awards for our excellent pupil attendance record. Congratulations to all concerned. Safeguarding is another aspect of a child's development that is taken very seriously. Mrs Crooks described the lengths the school goes to in supporting individual pupils who may be experiencing problems. In addition, Mr Holder outlined how any additional funding the school receives is being used to help our more vulnerable pupils make the progress they are capable of. Miss Timmins also reported how well pupils conduct themselves in school. She underlined how co-operating with staff enables pupils to thrive. Occasionally a pupil may be either unable or unwilling to co-operate in which case action is taken to put them back on the right path.

Please get in touch should you have any comments about what I've written. This Friday sees the start of the half-term break. On Monday 27 February pupils will return. For Year 11, as I mentioned earlier, it sees the start of the final build-up to the summer exams which begin in May. And so, until the next time I'll finish by wishing all the staff and pupils an enjoyable halfterm break and end with this prayer:

Loving Father, as we come to the end of another half term, we turn to you in confidence and place any difficult relationships into the healing hands of Jesus, your Son. Enable us to leave behind any regrets and bitterness. May the holiday be for us a time of rest and relaxation, to help restore us and re-create us in your image and likeness, as we enjoy more of the love and presence of our families on whom we ask your blessing. NEU Teacher Strike - 1 March 2023 confirmation of arrangements

Teachers who are members of the National Education Union have voted to strike again on the following dates: Wednesday 1 March, Wednesday 15 and Thursday 16 March.

The school has 26 teachers who are in the NEU. We do not expect all those teachers to strike, but we will need to make some changes to pupils' education on each of the strike days if they go ahead.

Plans for Wednesday 1 March:

- **Pupils in Years 7, 8 and 10** should attend school as normal. Year 7, 8 and 10 pupils should wear their PE kit and bring their school bag and equipment.
- Year 9 pupils have assessment week. They should attend school between 8.50am and 12.15pm. They will be able to have lunch and then go home at 12.15pm to revise in the afternoon.
- Year 11 pupils also have mock 2 assessments. They should revise at home in the morning and then attend school between 12.00 midday and 3.10pm. Lunch will be available at 12.00 midday when pupils arrive in school.

If any additional information comes to light, I will endeavour to inform you at the earliest opportunity if the above arrangements need to change. Thankyou for your patience and cooperation with these plans.

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent for the Catholic Church. Lent is a 40-day season (not counting Sundays) marked by repentance, fasting, reflection, and ultimately celebration. The 40-day period represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where he fasted and where Satan tempted him.

On Ash Wednesday, we receive ashes on our forehead to symbolise the dust from which God made us. As the priest applies the ashes to a person's forehead, he speaks the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

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





UoB Pathways Trip

On Tuesday 14 February, pupils in Year 8 went to the University of Birmingham on an outreach trip as part of their Pathways process. The aim of this trip was to inspire the pupils in the school to consider higher education when they leave school. On the day, the pupils were introduced to university life. They completed a quiz on different aspects on university, answering questions such as what does undergraduate mean and what does Russell group mean. They then had a tour of the University of Birmingham, which has a very big campus with lots of facilities. The pupils saw Old Joe (the tallest free-standing clock in the world), Aston Webb Hall, the different sports facilities, and even the Lapworth Museum of Geology where the pupils saw some stunning crystals and even a dinosaur. The pupils then had some lunch which was provided by the University, followed by a Q&A session with students from the University. 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


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Raffle Winner

Coventry University STEM Visit

In a recent workshop, pupils gained a deeper understanding of the important role that ethical practices play in building a fairer and more just distribution and generation of energy, especially in combating energy poverty. The workshop covered a range of subjects related to the ethics of data management, cyber security, and the energy sector and its operation.

Throughout the workshop, pupils engaged in fun and interactive activities designed to help them grasp the complexities of the topics. These activities included group discussions, role-playing exercises, and case studies that allowed the pupils to apply what they had learned in practical scenarios.

One key area of focus in the workshop was the importance of data management and cyber security in the energy sector. pupils explored the ethical considerations involved in managing sensitive data and how cyber security measures can be implemented to ensure that data is kept safe from potential threats.

The workshop also highlighted the need for ethical considerations in the energy sector's operations. 

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
Internet Matters six tips for keeping children safe while online gaming

Take an active interest in the games your children are playing to get to grips with how they work and why they enjoy playing them

Ask **who they play with online, who they meet and talk to**, and talk about what kind of language is being used. Make sure your child knows how to do report abusive or anti-social behaviour





For younger children, use 'airplane' mode settings on your tablet or smartphone. That way, they can play offline without making accidental purchases or connecting with someone they don't know

Use PEGI ratings and App store ratings to ensure your children are playing age appropriate games. **Help children understand why some games are allowed and others aren't**

> Gaming can be very addictive, so **agree boundaries and how long they're allowed to play** for and with whom they are allowed to play online with. Remind them that people may hide behind fake profiles and not be who they say they are

Teach your children to protect themselves by thinking critically – remind them not to share personal information and to keep gaming friends in the game only rather than adding them to their other social networks
