#### **NEU Strike Action**

The planned NEU strike action is due to go ahead next week. The arrangements will be as follows:

#### Wednesday 15 March:

- Year 8 and Year 9 pupils will be provided with work to complete at home.
- Year 7, 10 and 11 pupils will be educated on site.

Year 7 and Year 10 pupils should attend in PE kit and bring school bag and equipment. Year 11 should attend in normal uniform with equipment. Year 11 will be doing half a day, leaving after lunch at 12.15pm.

#### Thursday 16 March:

- Year 7 and Year 10 pupils will be provided with work to complete at home.
- Year 8, 9 and 11 pupils will be educated on site.

Some Year 8 pupils will be on the Globe Theatre trip and have been given separate instructions. The remaining Year 8 and all Year 9 pupils should attend in PE kit and bring school bag with equipment. Year 11 should attend in normal uniform with equipment. Year 11 will be doing half a day, leaving after lunch at 12.15pm.

On both strike days, pupils eligible for free school meals, who are working at home, can visit school to collect a meal during 12.30pm and 1.00pm if they would like one.

Please note that there is a planned bus strike on Thursday 16 March, so you may need to make alternative arrangements for your child to get to and from school.

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#### Transport for West Midlands Notice

Industrial Action on the Transport Network Starting Next Week

Dear all,

From Thursday 16 March onwards, public transport across the West Midlands region will be severely impacted by industrial action taking place by National Express drivers and engineers, this will have an impact on all National Express Bus Services in the West Midlands and Coventry.

Industrial action on the rail network will also impact services on **Thursday 16 March and Saturday 18 March** where there will be a limited rail service in operation across the West Midlands on these days.

For this reason, transport services will be extremely limited and roads will be busier than usual.

Please plan ahead, check before you travel and ensure you leave plenty of time for your journey. TfWM and operator staff will be present at bus stations and a small number of other locations on the network who can provide some help and support.

Journeys will be disrupted, please be patient and consider other passengers and all staff working on the strike days.

Please see below for further information on each transport mode.

The TDM and Behaviour Change Team will be back in touch with school early next week via email with some more targeted advice depending on the area you live or work in.

#### Bus

- Due to continuous industrial action from Thursday 16 March onwards, National Express West Midlands and Coventry will be operating a limited network at a reduced frequency and for a reduced period of the day.

- Services provided by other operators are unaffected and will operate as normal. This includes services on routes shared with National Express including those provided by Diamond, Arriva and Stagecoach.

- NX tickets will not be accepted on other operators.
- Bus services which will be running on strike days are likely to be very busy.
- Ring and Ride and West Midlands on Demand will operate as normal.
- National Express coach services are not affected and continue to run as normal. (If you are visiting Cheltenham Festival 16 -18 March, additional coach services are available: <u>Cheltenham Festival 2023</u> | <u>National Express</u>)

#### Rail

- Due to industrial action on Thursday 16 March and Saturday 18 March, there will be a limited rail service in operation across the West Midlands on these days.

- Services on 15, 17 and 19 March may also see some level of disruption with later starts and earlier finishes possible.



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
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




# **National Careers Week in Drama**

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
# National Careers Week in History and Geography

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


# National Careers Week in History

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# My child has seen porn, what do I do?

If your child has accidentally come across pornography or actively sought it out by searching for it, it will prompt questions about what they have seen.

Here are some things you can do to, to help them make sense of what they have seen and keep them safe in the future:

### Steps you can take

# Talk about it

- Have an age appropriate conversation and explain that there are some things online that are for adults only and if they see something that upsets them online, they should always come and tell you.
- It may be a good time to help your child think critically about the images they see online and offline.

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- Try and give them coping strategies to help them deal with any online content that online uncomfortable with like closing the laptop lid or turning off the screen.
- Reassure them that they can always come to you if they feel they have seen something online that has worried them.
- Be prepared that they may have questions about sex and relationships.
- Discuss the problem with other parents to encourage a shared strategy.

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# Block inappropriate content

- Limit the chances of exposure to inappropriate content by setting up filters and parental controls on devices – i.e. filters on your home internet, and YouTube Restricted Mode and Google Safe Search.
- Make sure the devices are used in a shared room, like living room or kitchen to limit.
- Report any child abuse images you find hosted by websites to the Internet Watch Foundation
