Head of Year Messages

Head of Year 7 and Year 8 Message

Year 7

This month Year 7 were invited to **Reach Out** in our Anti-Bullying Campaign. The theme of Reach Out came about following consultation with teachers and pupils by the Anti-Bullying Alliance which coordinates Anti-Bullying Week every year in England and Wales. Teachers and children wanted a theme that empowered them to do something positive to counter the harm and hurt that bullying causes. The whole school started off the week by wearing odd socks to highlight the importance that we are all unique.

Bullying affects millions of lives and can leave us feeling hopeless. But it doesn't have to be this way. If we challenge it, we can change it. And it starts by reaching out.

That's why I would like all parents and carers to talk to our pupils regularly about the importance of celebrating everyone's uniqueness and why we should show kindness to all. As a school we are focussing this term of the kindness of the Good Samaritan.

'But a Samaritan, as he travelled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. 34 He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him.' Luke 10:33-34

We must remember that although we may not always get along with one another, a kind act goes a long way to supporting friendships in the future.

In response to the question, who is my neighbour?' Year 7 will also be fundraising for a local charity called Saint Chad's Sanctuary this Advent. We are inviting each pupil in Year 7 to bring in an item of non-perishable food over the next three weeks so that we can hit our target of 130 food items by Christmas. We hope that everyone will be able to take part in this fundraiser which will help so many families within our city.

Year 8

November 14-18 was Road Safety Week and our One World Group have started working alongside the Department for Transport to become Active Travel Ambassadors. Their mission is to make the journey to school for all our pupils a happier, healthier and safer one.

Throughout the year the One World Group will design and deliver a campaign encouraging pupils to travel actively, safely or considerately. They also hope to raise awareness of the benefits of travelling actively, safely and considerately. All pupils across the school were invited to take part in a survey this week on how they travel to and from school and consider how they would prefer to come to school if they had a choice. It was amazing to see so many considerate responses from our pupils, with many reflecting on the current climate crisis and global warming, opting to prefer to walk or cycle to school as their preferred mode of transport, in the hopes that they can do that in the future.

This term we have asked pupils to live in solidarity with their neighbour. One way that they can achieve this is through considering those around the world who are impacted by climate change, and how, through active travel, they can begin to reduce the use of fossil fuels. Every little helps!

We are also calling on all pupils from Year 8-11 to support our Advent campaign, which this year is for local charity SIFA Fireside.

In Birmingham, many adults are homeless or vulnerably housed with the true figures often unknown due to the hidden homelessness that's associated with sofa surfing, modern slavery and individuals not making themselves known.

SIFA Fireside supports clients in their recovery from the effects of homelessness. From essential services such as the Adult Support Hub, Tenancy Support Services and the essential needs met through their Drop-in Centre, SIFA Firesides range of services exist not to 'throw money at the issues' but to stand by people while they rebuild their lives with safety and dignity.

We hope that you can help to support this amazing local charity by donating the following: Instant meals, canned meals, porridge, baked beans, chocolate bars, cereal bars, biscuits, crisps, coffee, sugar, bottled water, socks, jogging bottoms, jackets, roll matts, toiletries, trainers, plastic carrier bags.


It is nice to see that most pupils are still revising. Remember what our visitors have said "start revising early". This is the best advise we can give you.

Staff Book Reviews

Educated' by Tara Westover (non-fiction)

"Educated' is the autobiographical story of Tara Westover's upbringing in a Mormon survivalist home in Idaho. As fundamental Mormons, Tara's parents deliberately kept her out of formal education, believing that schooling would corrupt her. The book charts a complicated and toxic family dynamic, whereby Tara, her brothers and her mother are controlled by a charismatic and forceful father figure. Although this sounds bleak on the surface, the story is incredibly hopeful. Despite her family's mistrust of education, Tara grows up with a yearning to learn. She has to secretly fulfil this vocation- educating herself through whatever means she finds, until she is able, through her academic success, to find freedom from the restrictions of her childhood. Although many of us might find it difficult at times to get up for school, 'Educated' is a reminder of how precious education is; it is a gift which we should be thankful for, especially when considering those who have to fight for their right to pursue it. As well as portraying this important message, Westover's writing is poetic and lyrical; despite her complicated relationship with her parents, she expresses a deep love for the rural environment she grows up in and she describes it beautifully. I would recommend this book to anyone! ***** 5 stars."

Duke of Edinburgh Award

There are still places for Year 9 and 10 pupils to sign up to the Duke of Edinburgh Award.

The Duke of Edinburgh Award is an incredible experience and qualification which involves a range of activities and requirements in order to be gained. The award is made up of four sections.

1 Skill Section — A new life skill (outside of school lessons). There are hundreds of different activities that young people can choose from. Popular choices include music, art, drama, cooking, DJing, committee skills, graffiti art and sign language.

2 Volunteering Section – This section requires young people to spend approximately one hour per week doing voluntary work. This gives young people the opportunity to get out into their communities and give something back.

3 Physical Section – This section requires young people to spend one hour per week of their own time engaging in physical recreation. It can be any form of activity and does not need to be in a team or competitive environment.

4 Expedition Section- Walking, camping, map reading, team work, survival.

Cyberbullying conversation starters

Talking to 11-13 year olds



Before you start the conversation



Think about when and where is the best to talk - in the car or a neutral place where they feel safe



Jot down what you want to say to focus your mind and make the conversation relevant to them



Be open and encouraging to make them feel supported



Have a few bite sized conversations to give them time to process

What you need to know

Typically 11-13 year olds will:



Have access to a smartphone or tablet



Use the internet to play games



Do homework online



Watch videos on YouTube or socialise with friends



There has been a rapid growth in the number of TI-TS years olds using social media - often with accounts on multiple social networks



Children as young as 11 post an average of 26 times a day, attract 100 followers to every one of their profiles



Over two thirds of 11-12 year olds have a Facebook profile despite requiring users to be a minimum age of 13



Bullying is a learnt behaviour -so it's important to set a good example and regularly reinforce how to be a good digital citizen

Tips to prevent cyberbullying



Set parental controls on devices your child can access - see our parental controls guide



Talk to your child about what it means to have friends and followers online. Are they real friends? Can they trust them?



Be aware that your child might start exploring romantic relationships. Talk about what they can safely share and who to trust



Encourage your child to be kind to others and think about the impact that words and actions can have



Talk to your child about what bullying is (hurting someone on purpose/several times over) and how people might bully others online



Encourage your child to tell you if they see or experience cyberbullying



Talk to your child about how they use the internet and what they enjoy



Tell your child that if they can't talk to you they should talk to a teacher at school or contact organisations like Childline

Tips to deal with cyberbullying



Don't jump to conclusions. Gently explore with your child what has gone on before the message or the post



Stay calm if you find out your child is experiencing cyberbullying or cyberbullying others



Be aware that cyberbullying can be a continuation of, or a response to bullying already happening at school or elsewhere



Don't encourage your child to retaliate in any way that is angry, offensive or threatening



Be aware that all forms of bullying can make you feel very sad, afraid and alone. Reassure your child that together you will sort it out



Think carefully before taking away your child's access to their phone or tablet (this can increase Ioneliness)



Help your child to report any offensive content to the social media provider



Encourage your child to broaden their network of friends and to take part in activities that make them feel good about themselves



Seek help. You could talk to your child's school or if your child feels harassed or threatened, the police. There are also charities like Kidscape that can give advice
